

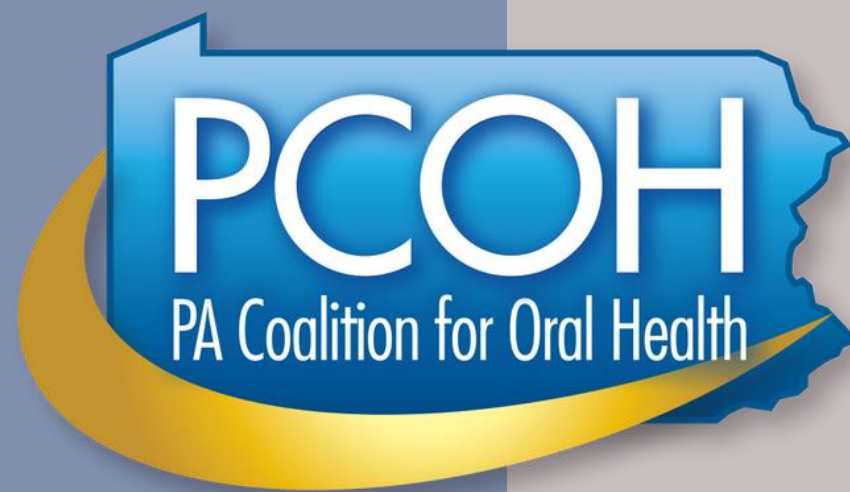

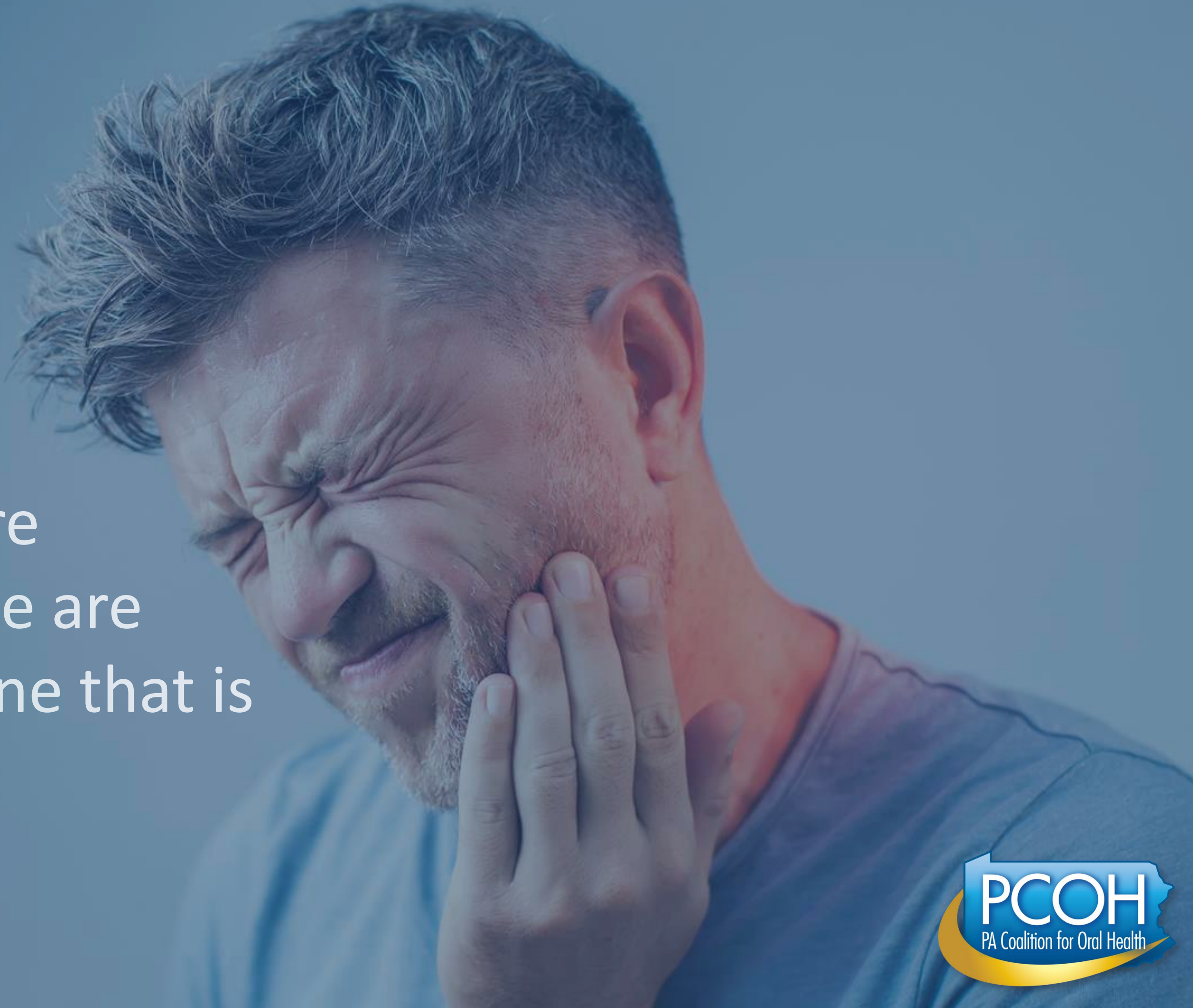

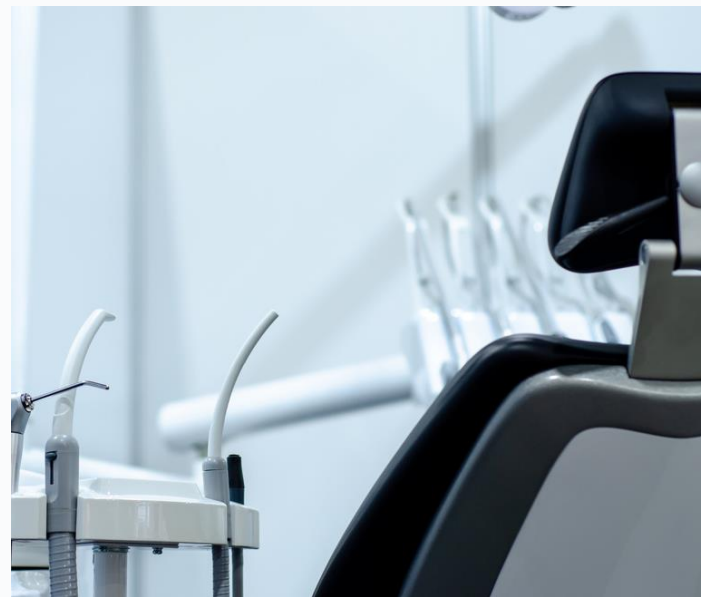

Current Concerns

Dental provider numbers are decreasing; dental health professional shortage areas are rampant in rural counties



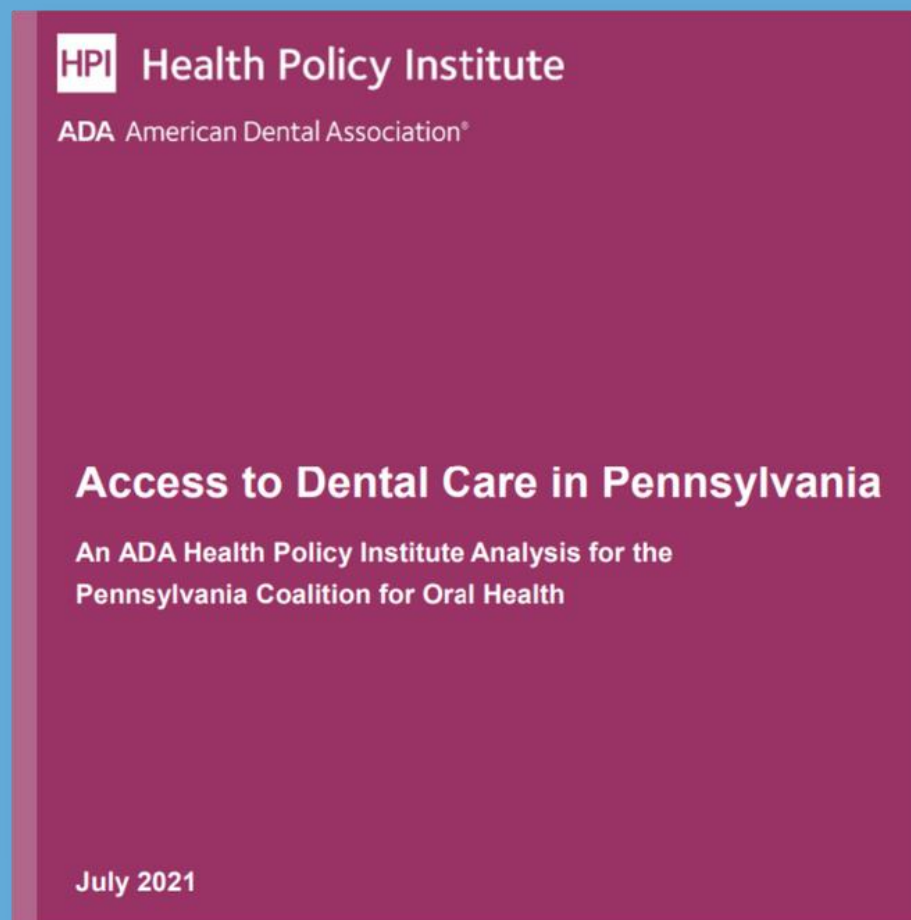
Individuals living in rural areas are struggling to access care, even in dental safety net clinics



Rural areas are being disproportionately affected financially by these problems.

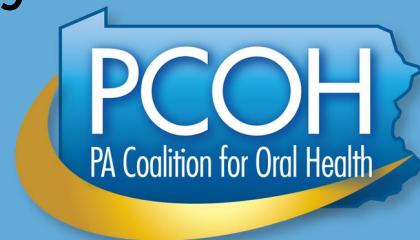

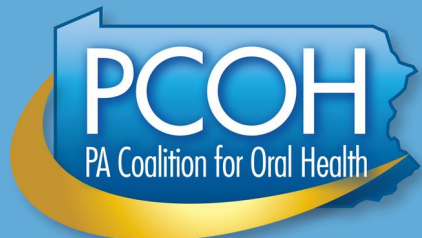
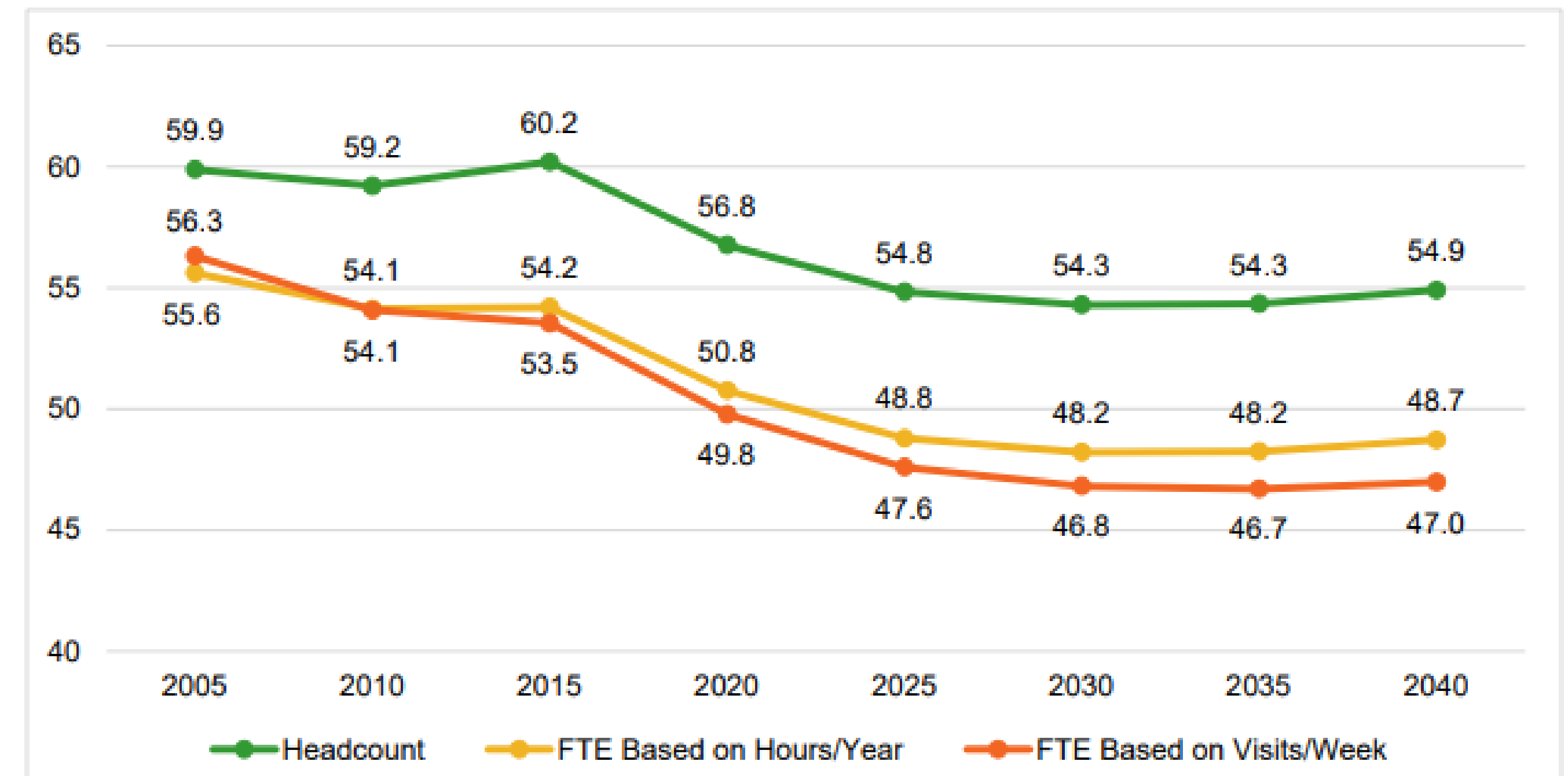

- The supply of dentists in Pennsylvania is projected to decrease on a per capita basis through 2030 and then stabilize through 2040.
- Pennsylvania is expected to gain slightly more than it loses. This slight gain will NOT keep pace with the state's projected population growth.
- The female share of the workforce is projected to increase from about 1/3 in 2020 to just over 1/2 in 2040. This could have important implications for access to care as female dentists, all else equal, are more likely to practice in DSOs, less likely to be practice owners, and more likely to be Medicaid providers.
- In other words, male dentists in Pennsylvania make up larger percentages of rural dentists. Given that male dentists are less likely to participate in Medicaid, Medicaid enrollees in rural counties would be affected by this finding

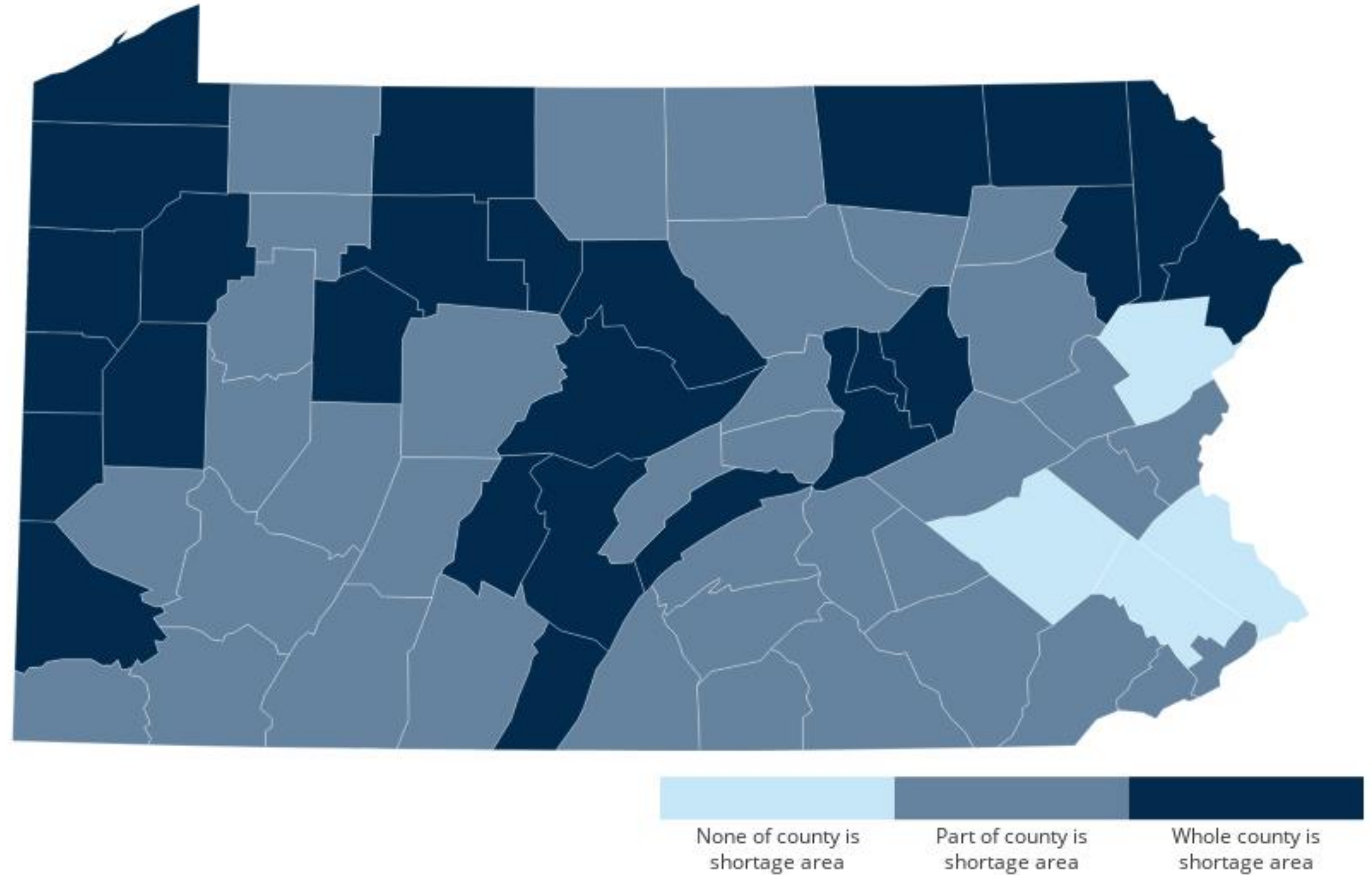

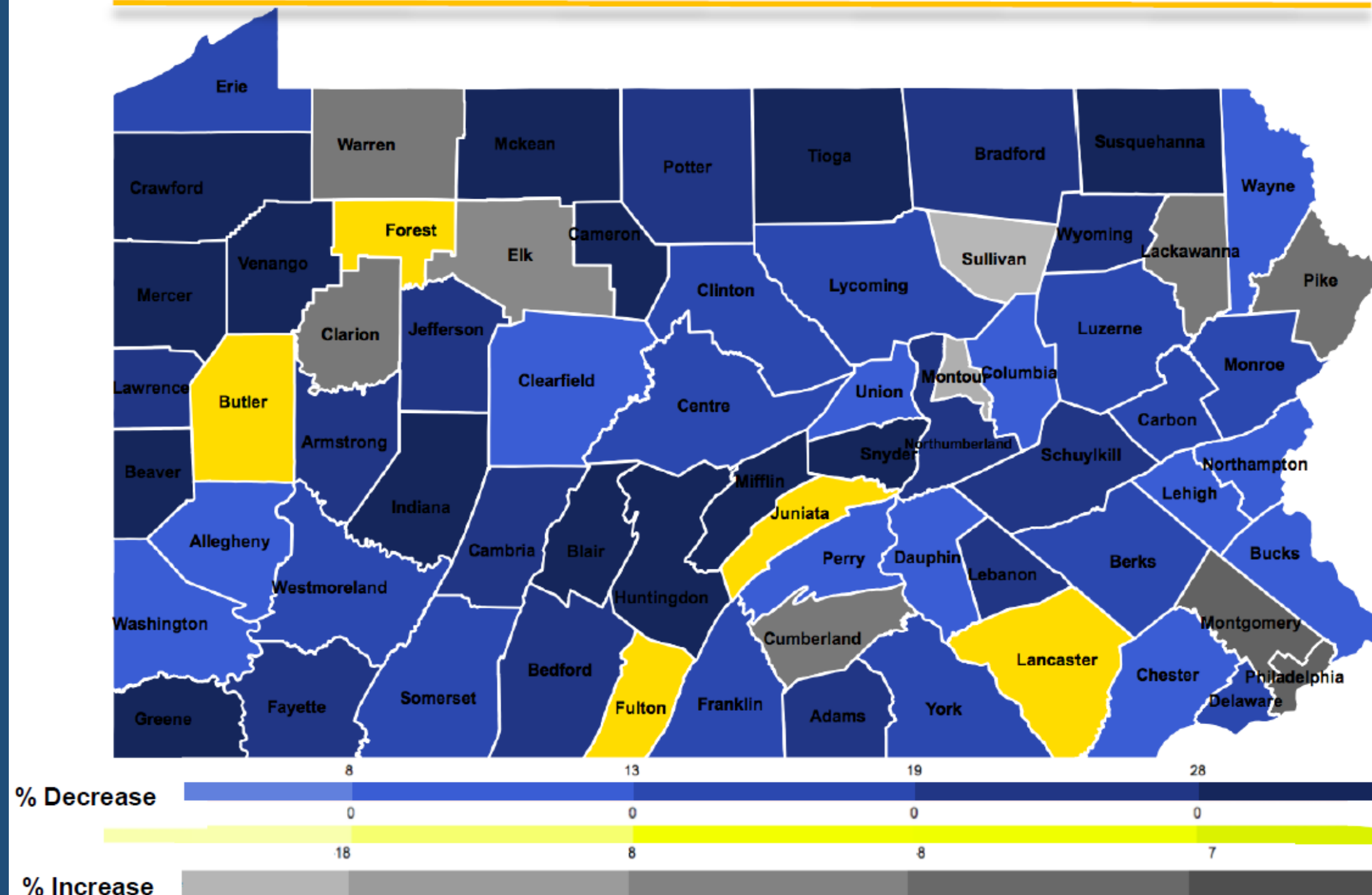

Key Findings in Rural

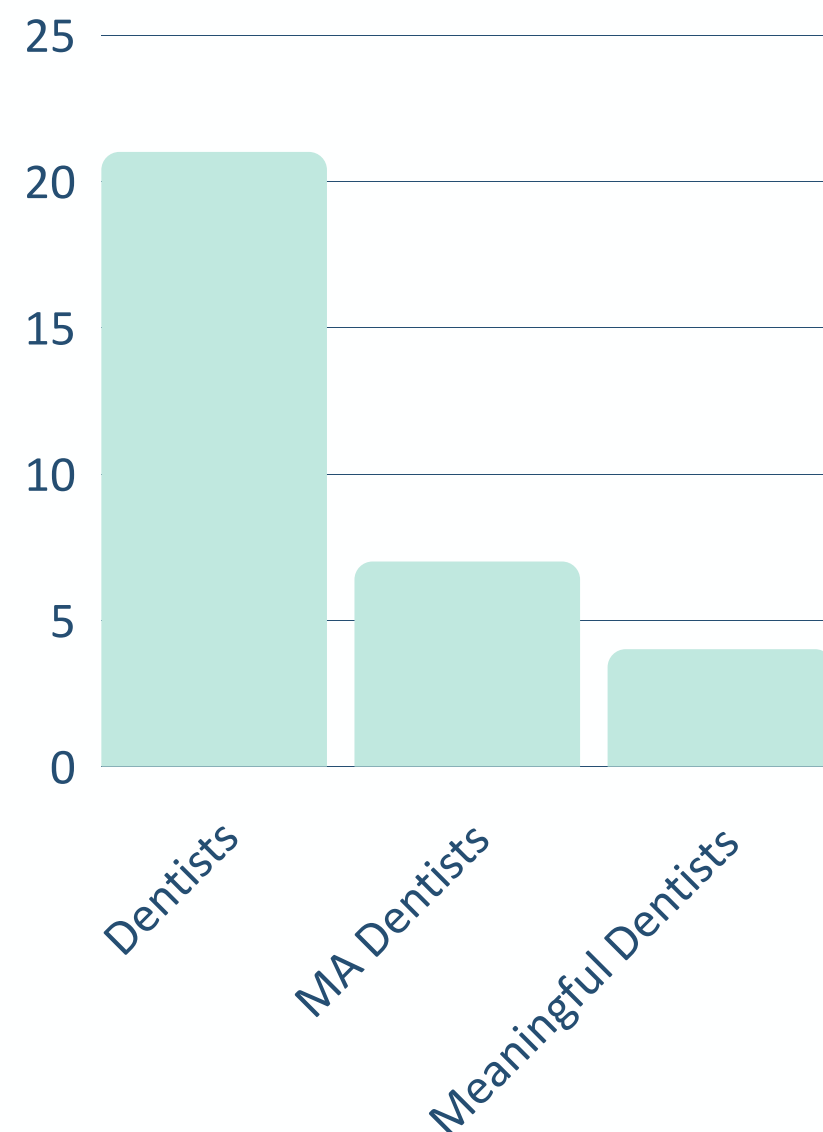
- Pennsylvania lost 216 rural dentists from 2015 to 2021, resulting in a 14.0% decrease in licensed dentist providers.
- This corresponds to a loss of approximately \$73,440,000 in labor income for rural counties and approximately 1,080 direct and 432 indirect FTE jobs in Pennsylvania's rural counties.

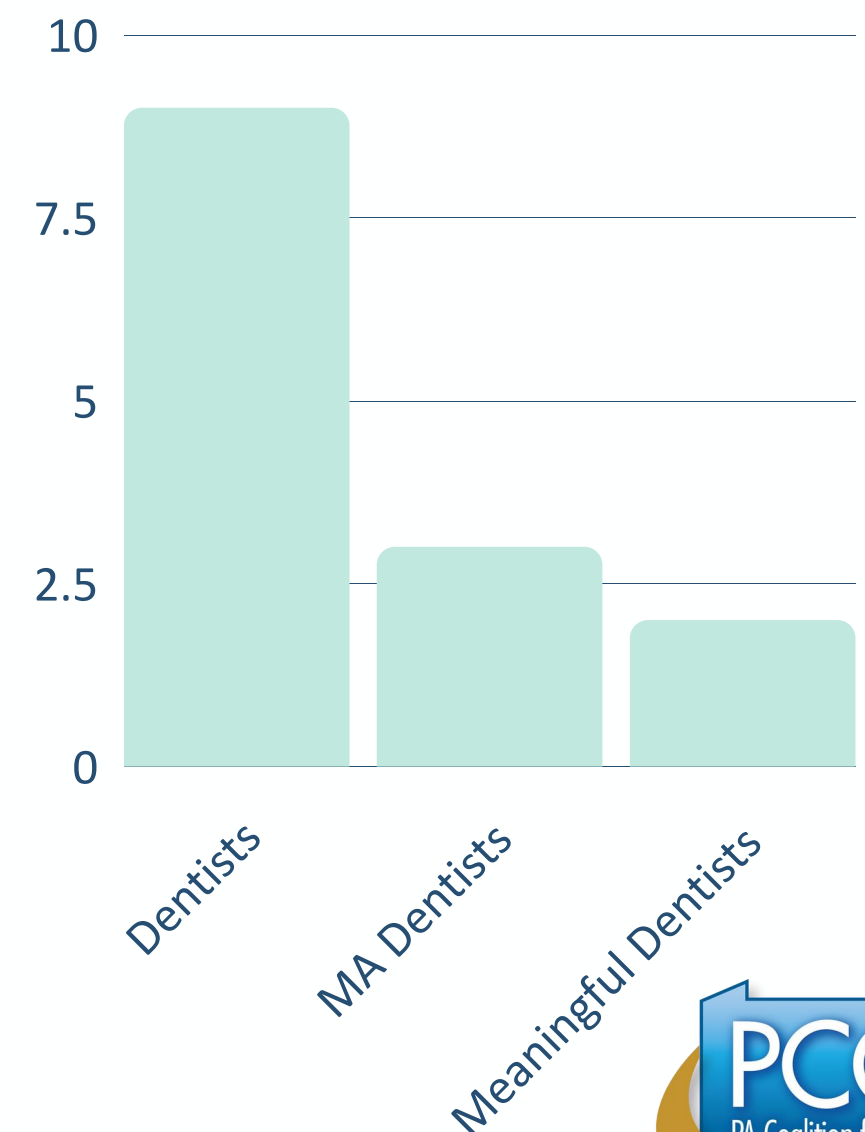

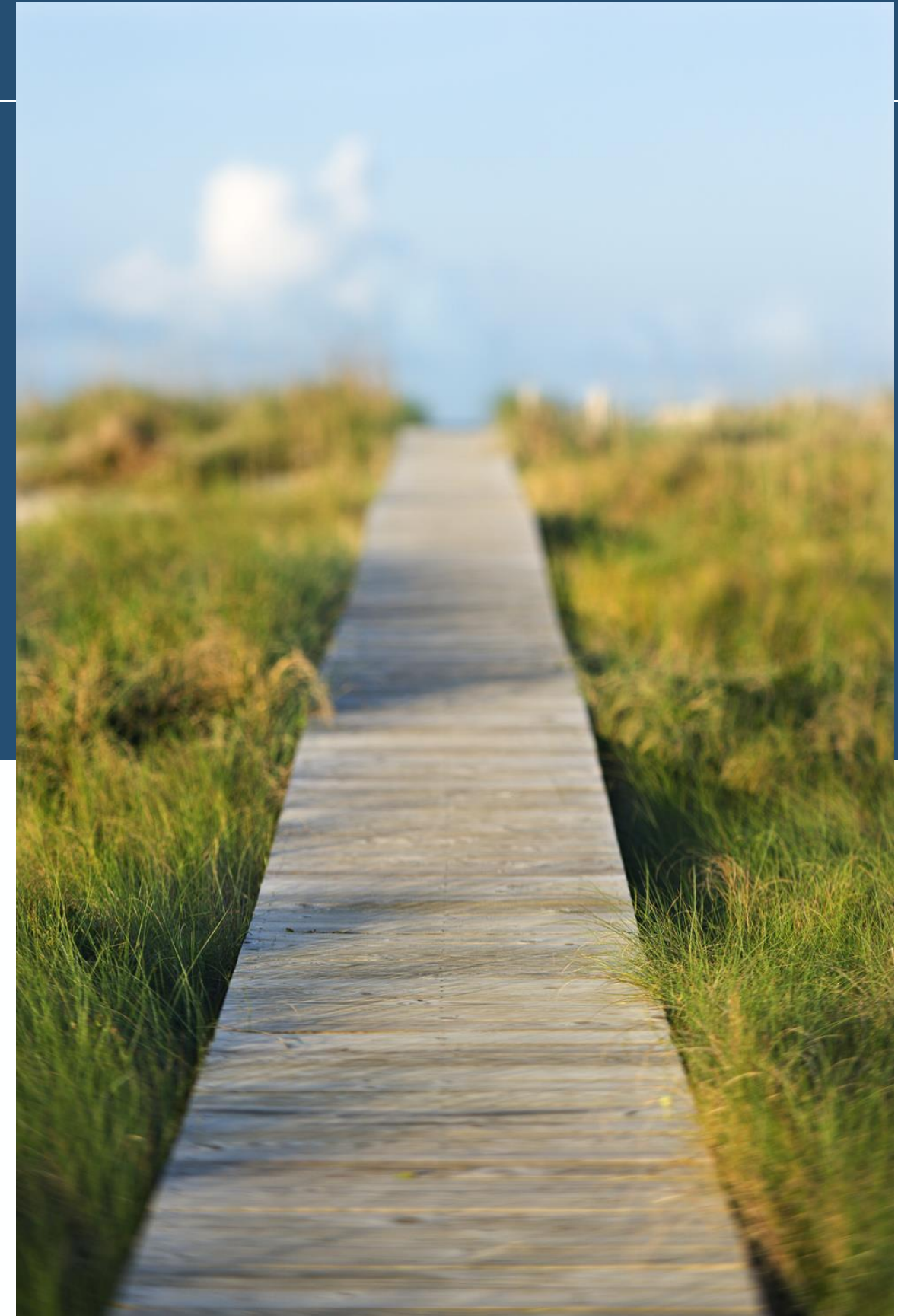

Access to Dental Care

- Rural areas have fewer providers and more transportation issues.
- Teledentistry is much harder to access due to broadband issues.
- It is becoming increasingly difficult to find a dentist who participates with insurance, particularly Medicaid



The Dental Safety Net

- FQHCs
 - 90% of FQHCs provide dental services
 - FQHC-based dental sites are available in approximately half of Pennsylvania's rural counties
- RHCs
 - Medical-Dental Integration was piloted in 9 RHCs in 2016
 - 13 RHCs are currently integrating oral health into their primary care practice and 7 RHCs provide some dental services on-site
- Free Clinics
 - 37 Free and Charitable Clinics in the state (decrease from 63 pre-COVID)
 - 8 are in rural counties
 - At least 17 are offering some form of dental services
- School Oral Health Programs
 - All schools must have a Mandated Dental Program (dental screenings in K/1, 3rd and 7th Grades) or a Dental Hygiene Services Program (education, screenings and preventive services)
 - 30+ School-Based Health Centers

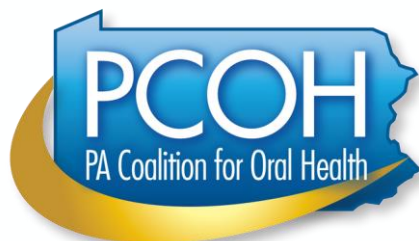

Sources of Loan Repayment

Pennsylvania Primary Care Loan Repayment Program (LRP)

Offers dentists the opportunity to apply for up to \$100,000 for full-time service and \$50,000 half-time services in eligible sites, both for two-year terms.

Dental hygienists can apply for up to \$60,000 full-time and \$30,000 half-time, also for two years of service in eligible sites.

National Health Service Corps (NHSC) Loan Repayment

All Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) are automatically eligible sites.

RHCs can qualify if they offer a sliding fee schedule.

Successful applicants receive up to \$50,000 for two years of full-time service and up to \$25,000 for part-time service.

For Current Students

The NHSC's Students-to-Service (S2S) program for fourth-year dental students.

The NHSC Scholarship program is available to students committed to primary care and accepted to or enrolled in an U.S. school training dentists.

Primary Care Loan Repayment Program

PA State Loan Repayment Program Distribution

50% to primary care providers, 25% to dental providers, and 25% to mental health providers; each is ranked separately.

For the dental providers, their 25% is allocated to the top scoring dental providers downward.

Dental Applications

For 2021, 33 of 226 applications were from dental providers. The average has been 17% of applications.

Dental Awardees

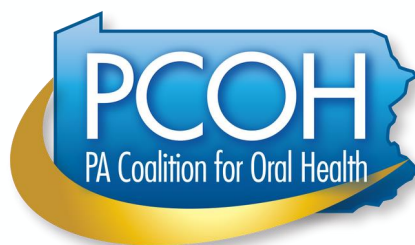
In 2021, there were 15 awards to dental providers.

Maximum award for dental hygienists is \$60,000.

Maximum award for dentists is \$100,000.

More hygienists have started to apply which makes the money stretch further.

There are currently 22 dental providers participating in the LRP

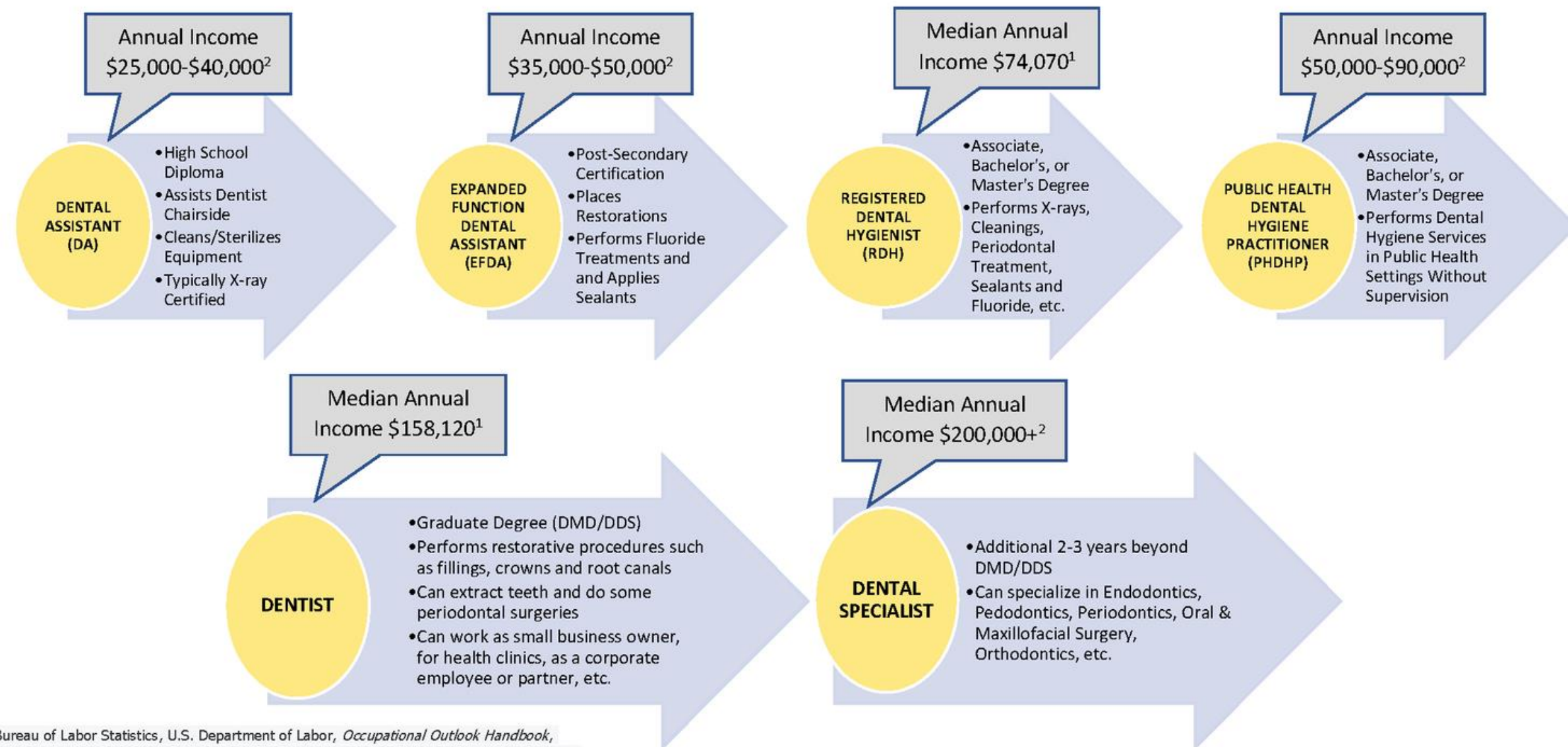

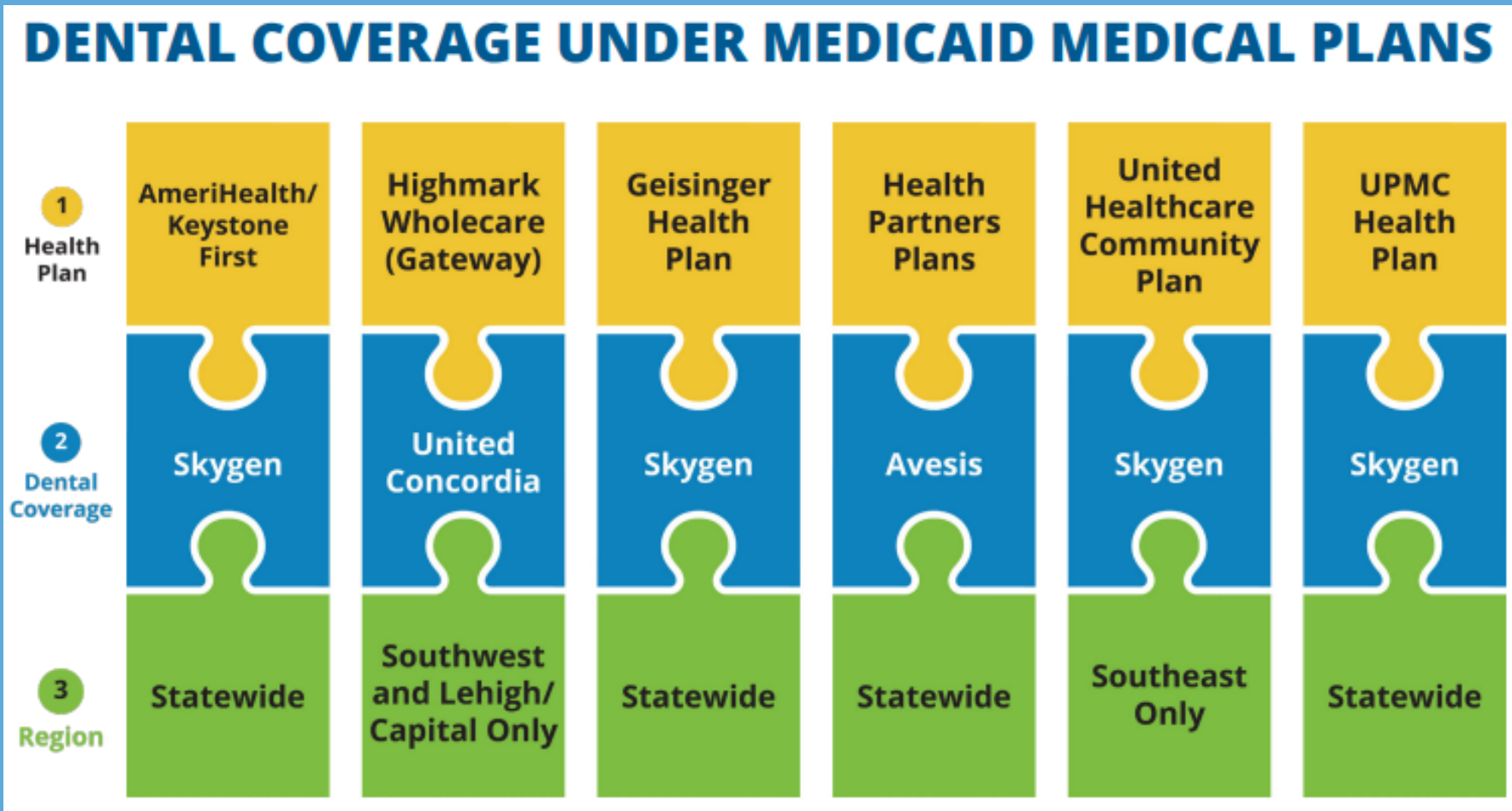
Clinical Dental Careers Pathway
